





UPDATE- 5/2/19

The Ohio State Highway Patrol has concluded their investigation into this accident, and they have cited the operator of the striking vehicle with assured clear distance, failure to wear a seatbelt and driving while texting.

One of our police cruisers was struck on I-275 Westbound this afternoon around 6 PM. It was occupied by one of our officers, who was assisting a disabled motorist. Both our officer and the driver of the striking vehicle were taken to UC West Chester Hospital for their injuries. Our officer sustained minor injuries and the operator of the striking vehicle sustained minor head and facial injuries. We are all very thankful that the outcome of this accident was not more serious in nature. USE OF FORCE REVIEW

A review of the use of force incidents that occurred in 2019 has been completed.

Of the 675 arrests made in 2019, there were 44 (6.5%) incidents where force was applied. Some incidents had more than one type of force applied.

TWO SUSPECTS RECEIVED MEDICAL TREATMENT AS A RESULT OF FORCE BEING APPLIED.

- One subject was seriously injured after shooting at an officer. The officer returned fire, striking the subject, The subject was hospitalized and charged with multiple offenses including Attempted Murder of a Police Officer.
- One subject was treated at the scene by medics for minor injuries.
- Additionally, three subjects were transported to a hospital for treatment of mental health issues.

THREE OFFICERS RECEIVED MINOR INJURIES DURING THESE INCIDENTS.

TWO OFFICERS RECEIVED SERIOUS INJURIES, A BROKEN LEG AND A SHOULDER INJURY, DURING THESE INCIDENTS.



CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS



SIGNIFICANT CASES

- **Gross Sexual Imposition-** Sharonville Detectives investigated Cesar Guerrero, the “Prophet” pastor, who took advantage of his young, female parishioners at his church located on E. Kemper Rd. Guerrero was arrested on federal charges and is facing ten (10) years in prison along with eventual deportation.
- **Gross Sexual Imposition-** Sharonville Detectives investigated a Gross Sexual Imposition complaint against a Princeton School District Security Officer. Lamont Baldwin has been indicted on twelve (12) counts of GSI, for having sexual contact with at least four (4) male juvenile victims. The offenses occurred over a period of several years. Baldwin is still awaiting trial.
- **Breaking and Entering/Theft-** Sharonville Detectives investigated the theft of seven (7) all-terrain vehicles (ATV) and go-carts, along with a trailer, from Tri-County Polaris on Chester Rd. The stolen merchandise was estimated to be worth \$20,000. Investigation has resulted in one (1) ATV and the trailer being recovered. This investigation has continued into 2020, and has expanded to multiple jurisdictions. Four (4) suspects have been identified as being part of a large theft ring involving the theft of high dollar ATVs and lawn equipment.
- **Unlawful Sexual Conduct with a Minor -** Sharonville Police Detectives investigated Kenjati Mills. Mills, a registered sex offender, was arrested in June of 2019. Mills was working at a local fast food restaurant when he met and started dating a juvenile female online. Mills was found at a Sharonville hotel with the female juvenile and arrested and charged with multiple offenses including Unlawful Sexual Conduct with a Minor.
- **Breaking and Entering/Theft -** Sharonville Detectives investigated a breaking and entering offense that occurred at the Sunoco Gas Station on Fields Ertel Rd. During the offense, approximately \$10,000 worth of merchandise was stolen. Through investigation, Guy Kenneth Coons was arrested and charged with Breaking and Entering in Butler County Court.






Top 25 Requesting Agencies




Drug Indications



Deployments by Month




Deployments by Day of Week










