# Message from the Mayor



Every few years, your city's elected officials and administrative team gather for a few hours to brainstorm large capital projects that we would like to accomplish within the next five years. Out of those discussions, we find consensus on four or five projects that we believe are desirable and financially attainable within that timeframe. Our last gathering a couple years ago identified the following four priorities for capital spending: Downtown Loop revitalization efforts; Railroad Crossing problem solving; Public Works department headquarters/garage; and Gower Park renovation. Here's a rundown on how we are doing with achieving these goals for the betterment of the community.

**DOWNTOWN LOOP REVITALIZATION:** Over the last year, the City has acquired many of the underutilized/vacant properties around the Loop. These acquisitions have enabled us to engage a developer and, in conjunction with our Sharonville 2030 Comprehensive Plan, create opportunities for significant new activity in the Loop. We are well into the design of Phase II of our Loop Streetscape plan that will refresh Reading Road and the community sidewalks and amenities along this stretch of the Loop. And hopefully you noticed this past Spring and Summer an increase in City programming on the Loop.

**RAILROAD CROSSING PROBLEM SOLVING:** All agree that our city's railroad crossings are a detriment to the safety and pleasure of our community. We continue to pursue grant opportunities to study and potentially find ways for automobile traffic to bypass one of these crossings. Unfortunately, to date, another public partner in such an endeavor has not surfaced. We have, however, invested with Trainfo – this company uses data analysis to accurately predict crossing delays and provide real time data for travelers to make decisions to reduce downtime. Our safety departments have been using this data for the last year; we intend to roll out the public notification components of this software in 2026.

**PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT HEADQUARTERS/GARAGE:** At the end of 2025, the city had the opportunity to purchase a warehouse on Tramway Drive to relocate our Public Works department and service garage. This is a long overdue upgrade for the quarters that our team has been using for decades. If all goes as planned, they should be moved into their new facility before the first snow fall of 2026-2027 winter season.

**GOWER PARK RENOVATION:** Over the last few months, we have shared the concept plans for the renovation of Gower Park and the Upper Grove. Construction on the Upper Grove phase of the plan will begin in 2026 with the intent to move on to the park in 2027/2028. New pickleball courts will be a focus of the Upper Grove renovation with other community amenities to make this a more attractive gathering location. If you haven't seen the extensive plans for Gower, I encourage you to visit Sharonville.org to check them out.

I am proud that over the last two decades, we have completed multiple capital projects that have allowed our city to shine and provide the necessary services that residents and businesses desire. And through careful planning, we've done it without incurring lengthy debt (for several years, we've carried NO general fund debt at all). Thank you for the input that you have provided on these plans as we continue to maintain Sharonville as THE place to Live, Work and Play!

## SHARONVILLE HAS HAD A LOT OF RECENT INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS IN THE PAST FEW YEARS. HOW ARE THESE PROJECTS FUNDED?

We are proud of the many infrastructure improvements we have completed over the last couple of years. Some of those projects include Sharon Road right turn lane, FEMA bridge, US 42 Shared Use Path and Kemper Path Re-pave. And we're not done! We are looking ahead to 2026 which will include Mosteller Road improvements, Cornell Road improvements, and Southbound Loop Streetscape.

The City is able to complete these infrastructure improvement projects with the help of grant money made available through a variety of agencies and funds. The City actively pursues grant money on most larger infrastructure projects we perform with grant funding covering 50-80% of construction costs. These funding sources include OPWC (Ohio Public Works Commission), SORTA MTIF (Southwest Ohio Regional Transit Authority Metro Transit Infrastructure Fund), OKI (Ohio Kentucky Indiana Regional Council of Governments), and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency). Each of these agencies have many different grant opportunities for a variety of construction activity. These are all competitive grants so, upon application, it is unknown whether the projects will receive funding.

The City works with our consulting engineers to determine suitable projects and to develop and submit applications. City Council reviews the project proposals and determines the proposed matching city funding percentage based on strength of project and points desired. Applications are given point values by the reviewing entities, ranked and funded top down until available funding is exhausted. City income tax and other income sources have allowed City Council to be aggressive in pursuing grants, often providing more than the minimum 20% local share to help our applications score higher to be awarded grant money while still stretching our infrastructure dollars.

## ICE & SNOW, TAKE IT SLOW

- ❗ **Clean off your vehicle before driving.**

▶▶▶ Each year in the U.S., there are over **1,000 deaths** and **100,000 injuries** due to vehicle crashes during winter weather.



### Knox Box

The fire department offers a temporary Knox Box for our elderly and hospice patients. It allows only the fire department to gain entry in the event of a medical emergency to save time and avoid the need to force a locked door open. Knox Boxes are on a first come first serve basis.

Our program is temporary, and we follow up annually to make sure it is still needed. We encourage residents to eventually purchase their own for permanent use as this helps our department keep some in circulation.



The fire department updates their Knox Box list twice a year so dispatch has the most up-to-date information concerning the Knox Box and its location on the resident's home. The fire department is the only entity with access to the Knox Box.

### WINTER SAFETY AWARENESS: FROSTBITE AND HYPOTHERMIA

**Frostbite** is an injury to the body caused by freezing of skin tissue and can cause a loss of feeling and color in the affected areas. It most often affects the nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers and/or toes. Frostbite can permanently damage the body and in extreme cases can lead to amputation. The risk of frostbite is increased in people with reduced blood circulation, those who drink alcoholic beverages, the elderly and people who are not dressed properly for extremely cold temperatures.

Signs of Frostbite: White or grayish-yellow skin area; skin that feels usually firm or waxy; or numbness. A victim is often unaware of frostbite until someone else points it out because the frozen tissues are numb.

If you suspect frostbite:

- Get into a warm room as soon as possible.
- Unless absolutely necessary, do not walk on frostbitten feet or toes. This can increase the damage.
- Immerse the affected area in warm – not hot – water or, warm the affected area using body heat. For example, the heat of an armpit can be used to warm frostbitten fingers.
- Do not rub the frostbitten area with snow or massage it, at all. This can cause more damage.
- Do not use a heating pad, heat lamp or the heat of a stove, fireplace or radiator for warming. Affected areas are numb and can be easily burned.
- Seek medical attention. If you believe that there are signs of both frostbite & hypothermia, the need for immediate medical care becomes more emergent.

**Hypothermia** occurs when body temperature falls below 95°F. About 20 percent of cold related deaths occur in the home. Young children under the age of two and the elderly (those more than 65 years old), are most susceptible to hypothermia.

Signs of Hypothermia: Uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness and exhaustion.

If you suspect hypothermia:

- Get medical attention immediately. If you can't get help quickly, begin warming the body slowly. Warm the body core first, not the extremities. Warming extremities first drives the cold blood to the heart and can cause the body temperature to drop further, which may lead to heart failure.
- If you are helping someone else with hypothermia, get the person into dry clothing and wrap in a warm blanket. Be sure to cover the head and neck.
- Do not give the person alcohol, drugs, coffee, or any hot beverage or food. Alcohol will lower your body temperature. Warm broth and food are better.
- Hypothermia can set in over a period of time. Keep the thermostat above 69°F, wear warm clothing, eat food for warmth, and drink plenty of water or fluids other than alcohol and caffeine to keep hydrated.

## SNOW REMOVAL PROCESS

- **PLOWING:** All major thoroughfares are plowed and treated first for emergency service vehicles so they can safely reach residences. Residential streets are secondary. If the major roadways are not passable, emergency services cannot reach any resident.
- **CUL-DE-SACS:** Please be patient. Large snow removal equipment often makes the full clearing of some of these areas impossible because of limited maneuvering ability. Alternate equipment may then be applied when storm conditions have subsided. Remove any portable basketball goals from the roadside, as this makes it very difficult for snowplows to maneuver around.
- **SNOW EMERGENCY:** When a SNOW EMERGENCY is declared, all vehicles on a street must be removed. Vehicles left unattended on a City street during a SNOW EMERGENCY will be removed by any reasonable means, including towing. Such expenses will be charged to the owner or person in control of such vehicle. The media (T.V., radio, as well as social medias) will announce the information when a SNOW EMERGENCY has been declared and when it has been lifted.



- **PARKING:** When snow is predicted, please park your car off the street whenever possible. Streets then can be plowed and treated much more effectively. When cars are parked on the street, it is impossible to plow more than one lane. This also reduces the amount of driveway you may have to shovel!

## SNOW SHOVELING GUIDELINES

- Do not shovel snow into the street.
- It is recommended to NOT shovel your entire driveway before a snow plow reaches your street as snow plows are on fixed angles. The ability to change direction is very limited. The City is not responsible for snow that is plowed from the street and re-deposited in private driveways. Plow operators have very few choices as to where the snow can go.
- Older residents & those with health problems are reminded to avoid the extreme physical activity associated with shoveling snow.
- If there's a fire hydrant outside your home or place of business, please consider maintaining it in the event of snowfall. A clear, 3-foot path on all sides makes hydrants easier to locate and can save precious time in an emergency.

## PERSONAL SAFETY

- Stay at least two car lengths behind a snow plow for every 10 mph you are traveling. Never cut in between a caravan of plows clearing a road or pass on the right.
- Beware of "black ice," roads that look wet but actually are glazed with ice. Ramps and bridges freeze first.
- Notify us of any potholes, curb, street, sidewalk or storm drainage problems in the City by using the City's website and visiting the Public Works page or calling the Public Works Department.



### TRASH COLLECTION REMINDERS

**Disposal of refrigerators, freezers and other appliances that contain chlorofluorocarbon (CFC) refrigerants** must have the CFC removed from the appliance by a Certified Technician and have documentation attached to the appliance verifying that the CFC has been safely removed. You must fill out paperwork at [https://www.rumpke.com/docs/default-document-library/freon-refrigerant\\_form.pdf](https://www.rumpke.com/docs/default-document-library/freon-refrigerant_form.pdf) and attach it to the appliance. Once you notify Rumpke of the pick-up, they will pick up the appliance on your normal trash pick up day.

**Upholstered couches and chairs, mattresses and box springs** can be placed at the curb with normal trash pickup. These items **MUST** be wrapped in plastic and sealed tight with tape. Please call RUMPKE at 513-851-0122 a day in advance to notify them of a large item pickup.

**Computers, fluorescent bulbs and hazardous waste** cannot be placed at the curb for Rumpke trash collection. The Hamilton County and Butler County Recycling and Solid Waste Districts can help you with disposal of electronic and hazardous waste items for homeowners **ONLY**. Fluorescent bulbs can be taken to hardware stores (Home Depot, Lowes, and Menards) for proper disposal.

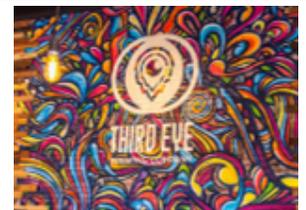

## SHARON CREEK RESTORATION PROJECT

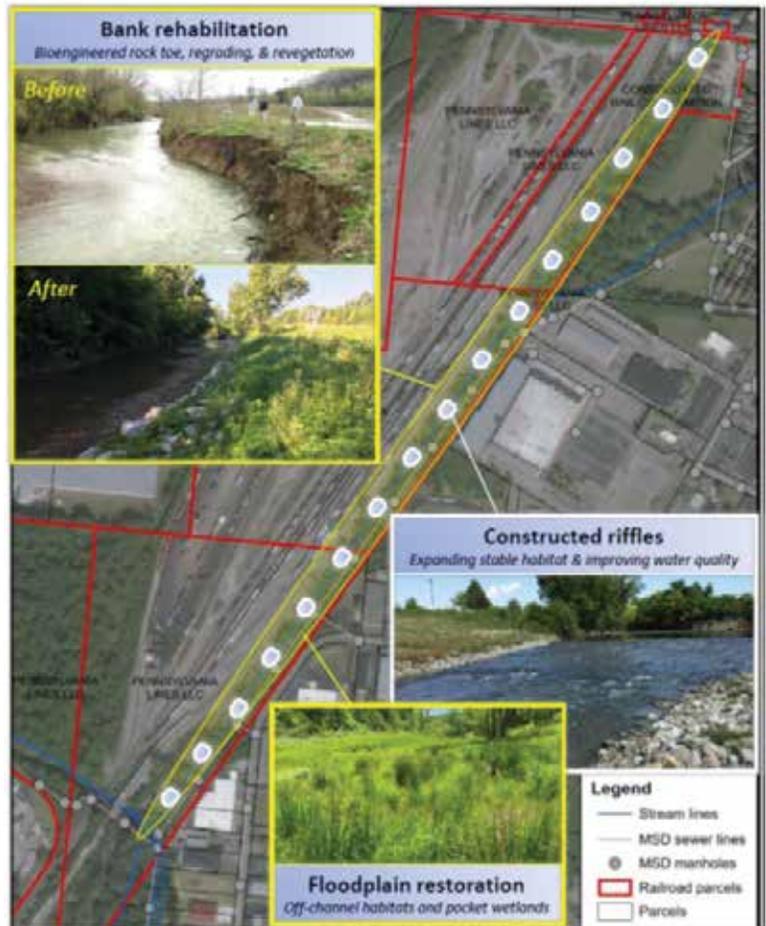
Work has been underway on the Sharon Creek Restoration project which rehabilitates 4,700 feet of stream channel and 14.7 acres of adjacent riparian corridor. It is one of the largest stream restoration efforts in the highly urbanized Greater Cincinnati region. The project starts at Sharon Road and extends down to Exon Drive in Evendale where Sharon Creek flows into Mill Creek mainstem. The Mill Creek Alliance (MCA) is managing the project on the property Great Parks of Hamilton County acquired in 2022 from Norfolk Southern Railway. In the coming years, the Sharon Creek Greenway multi-use recreational trail is planned to run along the top of the east streambank as part of building the Mill Creek Triangle Trail.

The Project restores the lower 0.8 miles of Sharon Creek sound of Sharon Woods through streambank regarding, floodplain connection and stream channel riffles.

1. **Streambank Regarding:** the project started early in 2025 with stabilizing streambanks at the site. Steep and actively eroding streambanks, as high as 15-feet in some locations, were excavated and regraded to a gentler and more stable angle. Large, boulder-size rock will be added to the base of the stream to armor the bottom of the bank. Bioengineering will add plants into the design to benefit a living matrix that adds structure, responds to environmental changes and produces food to support a thriving ecosystem.
2. **Floodplain Connection:** floodplain connection to the stream expands riparian habitats with pocket wetlands that have previously been inaccessible to amphibians and other aquatic wildlife. Dense replanting with a hardy native seed mix will further ensure a better functioning ecological habitat.
3. **Stream Channel Riffles:** there will be 16 in-stream riffles built with large rocks to stabilize the stream channel, improve oxygenation and expand habitat for aquatic macroinvertebrates.

The restoration work is funded through grants from Ohio EPA's 319 program, the Clean Ohio Fund and a grant allowing Great Parks to acquire ownership and easement from Norfolk Southern Railway.

The project is expected to be completed by the end of 2025. In the coming decades, stewardship of the site led by Great Parks of Hamilton County, will ensure the restored riparian corridor is a natural and community asset.



## GARAGE AND YARD SALES

The City of Sharonville has guidelines to regulate garage and yard sales from residential properties. Garage and yard sales are allowed in Sharonville, but for no more than four (4) consecutive days in a row and no more than four times a year. There is no permit required to hold a garage sale but keep in mind that posting signs advertising a garage or yard sale are not permitted in the public right-of-way or on utility poles.

# ENERGY AGGREGATION UPDATE

## ELECTRIC

The next City of Sharonville Electric Aggregation program begins with your December 2025 billing cycle and continues through November 2026. The supplier is Dynegy, and the fixed rate for the term is \$0.0939 per kWh. Opt-out letters outlining the offer were mailed to eligible residents and small businesses in the fall. If you did not receive a letter, but would like to join the program, contact Dynegy at 1-888-682-2170 from 8 AM – 8 PM EST and ask specifically to join the City of Sharonville Electric Aggregation program.

## NATURAL GAS

Our current program continues through June 2027 at a fixed rate of \$0.542 per ccf with IGS Energy. The rate and IGS logo will appear in the Billing Section for your natural gas if you are a member. If you are interested in entering the program, contact IGS Energy at 1-877-353-0162 and ask to join the City of Sharonville Natural Gas Aggregation program. If you are already with another supplier, carefully review the terms & conditions of that contract as your ability to terminate early may be restricted or penalized.

### Reasons for not being included in the Aggregation Program:

- You are not located within City of Sharonville boundaries.
- You are already under contract with another electric supplier. If this is the case, review the terms & conditions of that contract closely, as your ability to terminate early with that supplier may be restricted or penalized. If not, ask that your account be returned to the utility at your next meter read and contact Dynegy (electric) or IGS (natural gas).
- You are a business customer using more than 700,000 kWh on an account or are considered a national account by the utility
- You are a PIPP (Percentage of Income Payment) customer.
- You are in arrears with the utility.

Once enrolled in the program, you will begin receiving the aggregation price within 1-2 billing cycles. As always, participation is voluntary, and you may leave the program at any time without penalty or cancellation fees by informing the energy supplier.

## Filing Due Dates for 2025

**Payment of Estimate Taxes:** 2025 estimate tax payments are due by **January 15, 2026** if you expect to owe \$200 or more. Failure to pay by this date may result in a penalty.

**Individual Returns:** On or before **April 15, 2026**. Tax returns are being mailed to all registered residents during January. Forms and instructions are also available on our web site at [www.sharonville.org/DocumentCenter/Index/61](http://www.sharonville.org/DocumentCenter/Index/61) under Individual Tax Forms.

**Net Profit Business Returns:** On or before **April 15, 2026** or the 15th day of the 4th month following the end of the fiscal year. If a business has a federal extension their due date for municipalities is now eleven months after the business' year end.

**Withholding Reconciliations:** On or before **February 28, 2026**.

### Do I NEED TO FILE A TAX RETURN?

The answer is yes if any of the following apply:

- You are a resident of Sharonville 18 years old or older, regardless of your income level or whether you own or rent your residence.
- You are a non-resident who works within the City of Sharonville and your income is not fully withheld by an employer.
- You are engaged in a business within the City of Sharonville and have sales, perform services or own rental property, whether or not tax is due.
- Your business is located within or doing business within the City of Sharonville.

### WHAT DO I NEED TO BRING WITH ME OR SEND IN WITH MY SHARONVILLE TAX RETURN?

1. W-2 form(s)
2. Federal 1040 tax return including:
  - Schedule 1, C, E, F and/or 4797
  - Documentation for any income reported on your Federal tax form Schedule 1, line z as "other income"
  - Any other federal schedules or forms which document deductions or additions to your local tax return
3. Copies of other local tax returns or refund requests you've filed

## How Do I Pay My Tax?

- Check or money order payments may be mailed in and should be made payable to "City of Sharonville Tax".
- Payments by check, money order, cash or credit card are accepted at the tax office. A fee is charged by the processing company for debit or credit card payments.
- Payments may also be made through ACI Payments either online at [www.sharonville.org](http://www.sharonville.org) or by phone at 1-800-487-4567. ACI Payments charges a nominal fee for this service which may be calculated using the fee calculator available.
- If your balance has been sent to the Ohio Attorney General, all payments must be paid directly to them at P.O. Box 89471, Cleveland OH, 44101. If you have questions, contact them at 1-888-871-8838 or visit their web site at [www.ohioattorneygeneral.gov](http://www.ohioattorneygeneral.gov).

## WHAT INCOME IS TAXABLE?

- Qualifying wages are defined by the IRS tax code section 3121(a). It includes many different types of income, including but not limited to wages, sick pay, vacation pay, commissions, severance pay, settlements, bonuses, fringe benefits, short-term disability pay, stock options and deferred compensation. It is usually found in Box 5 (Medicare wages) on your W-2, however there are some exceptions.
- Other income (generally listed on line 8 of your Federal 1040 Schedule 1) such as gambling winnings, HSA and scholarship distributions, director's fees, jury duty income and prize winnings.
- The net of all profit and losses from profession and/or business operations.

## WHAT INCOME IS EXEMPT FROM TAX?

- Interest, dividends, some royalties
- Capital gains (unless considered ordinary income)
- Alimony
- Military pay and allowances
- Proceeds from qualified IRS defined retirement plans
- Social Security benefits, welfare benefits, unemployment insurance benefits, workers' compensation

This information regarding income is not all encompassing. Please contact our office if you have questions regarding the taxability of specific types of income.

## WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY ESTIMATE PAYMENTS?

All federal, state, and local taxes are due during the year that income is earned. Most companies withhold federal and state taxes from your paychecks, but they may not withhold local income taxes, or may withhold less tax than our 1.5% rate. If a taxpayer reasonably expects to owe \$200 or more due to not having at least 1.5% local tax withheld they need to make estimate payments or may be charged penalties.

If you owe less than \$200, but still wish to make estimated payments please note this on your tax return.

Second quarter estimate payments are due by June 15, 2026. For your convenience a coupon will be sent with your 2025 tax return. Invoices will be sent for the 3rd and 4th quarter payments which are due on September 15, 2026 and January 15, 2027.

## WHY DO I HAVE TO INCLUDE MY FEDERAL 1040 FORM?

All municipalities in the State of Ohio now require a copy of your federal 1040 form to be included with your local tax return. This helps us assure we have all the necessary paperwork and are taxing & giving credits for the correct amounts.

## HOW CAN I GET AN EXTENSION?

If you have received a federal extension to file, you automatically can have an extension with the City of Sharonville until October 15, 2026. A copy of the extension must accompany the filed tax return to avoid penalties. If you do not apply for a federal extension you may request an extension in writing with our office by April 15, 2026. **Please remember that an extension to file does not give you an extension to pay your taxes, so be sure to make all payments by April 15th.**

## PROPERTY TAXES

The collections of property taxes (whether it is for residential property or business property) are the responsibility of Hamilton County or Butler County. **The City of Sharonville does not receive property tax dollars from city residents or businesses and is proud that a municipal property tax has not been levied in over 40 years.** For further information on the collection and payment of property taxes, please contact either the Hamilton County Auditor's office at (513) 946-4000 or the Butler County Auditor's office at (513) 887-3154. Links to these offices are available on our website.

## SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX

The City of Sharonville is within the Princeton City School District. The code for state income tax form purposes is 3116.



## MOST COMMONLY MADE ERRORS

### Not Attaching the Required Forms W-2(s), Federal 1040 and Schedule 1

In addition to your Federal 1040 form, we need your W-2(s) and if you file a Schedule 1, we will need a copy of it as well as any included additional schedules (C, E, F and/or 4797). This will clarify the income reported on Schedule 1 and eliminate unnecessary correspondence. Failing to include your completed Federal tax return as well as W-2s can result in a late filing penalty.

### Too Much Credit for Other Municipalities

Credit for taxes withheld or paid to another municipality is available to residents. It is limited to 1.5% of the amount of W-2 wages taxed to another municipality, and no amount exceeding the 1.5% limit will be credited toward additional taxable income. Credits for taxes paid for business income are also limited to 1.5% and are pro-rated based on the percentage of total business income. Documentation is required for any credit. We added Worksheet A on the back of your Sharonville Income tax return to help you calculate this credit. There are no credits given for county, mental health or school taxes paid.

### Net Operating Losses

Businesses, including individuals filing Schedules C, E, and/or F, may use 100% of any losses carried forward from 2020 through 2024 on their 2025 tax return.

## Community Center Access Policy

Every person entering the Community Center must stop at the Customer Service Desk to state his/her purpose of coming to the Community Center. If you are a member, please make sure to scan your membership card each time you enter the Community Center and Pool. In order to be as safe as possible and pursuant to City of Sharonville Ordinance Number 2014-13, ALL resident and non-resident guests, ages 18 years and older, purchasing a guest pass will be required to provide a valid driver's license or state ID card. This card will be scanned by the "Safe Point" System against the National Sex Offenders Registry.

The entire membership card data base is scanned through the "Safe Point" system twice a year. New members and renewal members joining the Community Center will be scanned before membership cards are given to the members. Should your driver's license or state ID card match a National or State Sexual Offender Registry record or if you do not provide a valid driver's license or state ID card, you will not be permitted to enter the facility. There is an appeal process.

Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on Recreation property without permit from the Recreation Director. This includes but is not limited to parks, shelters, Community Center, pools, and parking lots.



## Stay & Play Zone

The Stay & Play Zone is available for children ages 1-6 while their parent/guardian works out or participates in a program. Nursery service is FREE for children who have a current Combo Membership. The fee for those without a membership is \$3.00 per child per hour. Maximum 2 hours per day. A waitlist will be implemented if we reach our maximum capacity at any time.

## Guest Policy \*Guest Fee is \$5 per Person

Our goal in this policy is to accommodate our members as best as we can, without creating a potentially unsafe or unfair usage of the facility.

- Members age 10 & over may enter the Community Center by themselves. Members under the age of 10 must be accompanied by an adult, age 18+.
- The fee for a member to bring a guest is \$5.00 per person. Guests ages 2 & under are not subject to a fee.
- Members ages 10 to 17 are permitted to bring no more than 2 guests per day.
- Adult members over the age of 18 are permitted to bring up to 5 guests per day. If the guests are from the same family as the member, they are permitted to bring more than 5.
- Example: An adult member over the age of 18 is bringing their adult daughter, son in law, and five grandchildren from out of town to visit the pool. Since all guests are from the same family as the member, this would be permitted.
- All guests over the age of 18 are required to provide a valid driver's license or state ID to be scanned by our SafePoint system against the National Sex Offenders Registry.
- Members are responsible for the behavior of their guests while they are in our facility. The Recreation Department reserves the right to ban future entry.
- All guests are required to complete the guest sign in sheet when entering the Community Center.
- Guests are required to leave the facility with the member once they have completed their activity.
- **Discounted guest pass bundles can be purchased at the Community Center front desk only. Purchase 5 guest passes in advance for only \$20.00 and 10 in advance for only \$35.00.**

## Refund Policy

Membership and class refunds will only be given in cases of medical circumstances (a doctor's note may be required), if the member moves, or if the class is canceled. Refunds are obtained by filling out proper paperwork at the Customer Service Desk. Checks will be sent to your residence within four weeks. If paid by a credit card, refunds will be credited back to the card that was used for the transaction.

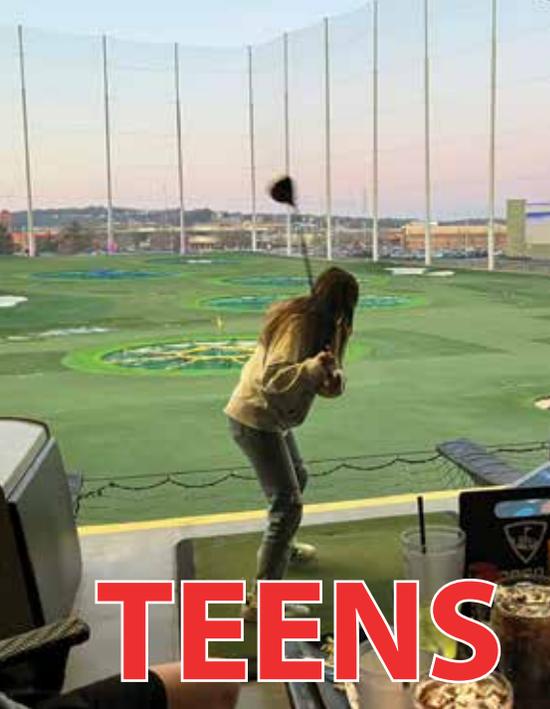
